First Quarter Church Council Report

The Church Council meets on the second Monday of the month. The meetings begin and end with prayer and conclude with the singing of *The Doxology*. President Randy Priem made special note at January's meeting that the Church works only when the people in it work together. In March, he stressed the importance of "doing" vs. "responding" and gave as an example the cooperation witnessed between the many members who helped in various ways in preparing for and hosting both the Rummage Sale in February and the Potato Pancake Supper on March 1st.

In the first three months of 2022, the Council has discussed and/or addressed several matters and received reports as follows:

Financial: Although income averaged an approximate \$500 shortfall each month in 2021, all obligations were met. Our income requirement for 2022 is \$2,532 per week. January's shortfall was \$2186.29 and February's \$233.49. There remains a positive balance in the checking account. 10% of the proceeds of the Rummage Sale and the Potato Pancake Supper have been designated for missions. Half of the balance of the proceeds from the Rummage Sale were given to the LWML for their mission efforts. Mission funds for 2021 were distributed to the Florida-Georgia District President's Discretionary Fund; the FL-**GA District Circuit 7 Pastors** Discretionary Fund; and the Family Hope

Resource and Pregnancy Center in Dunnellon in the amount of \$500 each. Facilities: At the present time, everything is in working order, although aging. Issues will be addressed as they arise. The Trustees have been trained to test the water to keep us in compliance with county and state requirements. Several areas of the carpeting need attention to prevent hazards. For the long-term solution, possible replacement, or installation of a combination of carpet, laminate or tile, will be investigated for further discussion as information becomes available. "Little Pantry" supply and bookshelves have been built and installed in the Library. Many of the tools available to the lawn crew are in poor condition and a mower needs replacement. Members are welcome to donate tools they no longer use. Pastor's Report: Due to continuing concerns over the COVID-19 variants, returning to previous worship practices regarding communion, offerings, sign-in sheets, etc., has been postponed at least through March. Safe practices will be encouraged with regard to worship and fellowship activities. Council will continue to evaluate resumption of fellowship and community meals. ******

Hi, Happy Spring to All! First, thanks to everyone who helped with our Rummage Sale in February! We had a LOT of great help the whole week plus the day of the sale and made almost \$1400! The first 10% goes to missions, and half of the balance goes to our treasury, of which most will also go to missions (we usually send/give most of our treasury away around Christmas).



Also, great thanks for all the socks! We will continue to put some in the pantry box outside along with food for anyone needing them. Beginning April 1, we will begin collecting diapers and baby wipes for The Family Hope, Resource and Pregnancy Center in Dunnellon. Working toward 80 packages (not individual diapers or wipes).

Donna Hagan from the Pregnancy Center (the group who will receive our diapers/baby wipes) visited us at our March 7 Bible study. Wow! She and her husband have taken the Pregnancy Center that was there and exploded it exponentially, with resources for pretty much anything you might need help with, and EVERYTHING they do is backed up by the Bible. We had a wonderful Bible lesson that day, as well as learning how they support members of our community. I'm sorry more folks couldn't be there, but Donna says, "Whoever God wants to be there will be there", and eight of us were there.

We will continue with our book, "Pew Sisters" at Bible study, on April 4 and May 2, take the summer off and start up again September 12.

Our next three Mite Sundays are April 3, May 1 and June 5. Thank you again for filling and bringing your mite boxes regularly!

Our Zone Prayer Service at Our Redeemer on March 19 was very nicegreat program- and there were four of us from Peace, about 30 ladies total. It was so great to see them!

WhoWhatWhereWhyWhenHow?

Here we are beginning the second quarter of 2022. We've held a rummage sale and a potato pancake supper after experiencing two years of being nearly immobilized by COVID and its variants. Our faithful God has brought us through and we acknowledge He will always be in control no matter how dire our circumstances. Whew! It's not up to any one of us.

We are in the season of Lent leading up to Easter on April 17th. The parament colors change from violet to white, then black, red, and green. Violet signifies Christ's royalty; white, His purity; black, our sins which He took upon Himself; red, His blood shed for us; and green, represents our growth in learning about Him.

Alleluias and hallelujahs return in our liturgy and hymns on Easter! This new quarter also includes Palm Sunday on April 10th; Maundy Thursday, April 14 ("maundy" is based on the root word for "command" as Jesus commanded His disciples to wash one another's feet); Good Friday, April 15; Ascension Day on Thursday, May 26th; Pentecost on Sunday, June 5th; and Trinity Sunday, June 12th, on which we use the Athanasian Creed which teaches the distinction between the Persons of the Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

We remember the Apostles, Sts. Philip and James, on Sunday, May 1st, and the Nativity of St. John the Baptist on Sunday, June 26th.

Secular commemorations include Mother's Day on May 8th; Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 21st; Memorial Day, Monday, May 30th; Flag Day, June 14th; Father's Day, the 19th; as well as Juneteenth the 19th. Submitted by Becky Williams

Blessed Shall You Be in the city, and blessed shall you be in the field. Blessed shall be the fruit of your womb and the fruit of your ground and the fruit of your cattle, the increase of your herds and the young of your flock. Blessed shall be your basket and your kneading bowl. Blessed shall you be when you come in, and blessed shall you be when you go out. (Deuteronomy 28:3-6)

This is God's promise to the Israelites as they stood beyond the Jordan outside of the Promised Land. He promises blessing to His people. He will make them prosper, whether they are in the city or the field. He will make their fruit of their work to prosper, whether from the ground, their wombs, their flocks, or their herds. He will make them to prosper in all things, whether upon their coming in or their going out.

But there's a catch. He would do this for Israel only "if you obey the voice of the LORD your God." (Deut. 28:2b) If they did that, He would cause that "all these blessings shall come upon you and overtake you." (Deut. 28:2a). If they didn't obey the voice of the Lord, if they didn't keep the commandments of the Lord and "walk in his ways" (Deut. 28:9), they would be met with curse and woe. The blessings would be replaced with curses. Everything that the Lord promised to prosper and bless would be cursed and fail.

Thanks be to God that our Lord Jesus Christ has come into our flesh and fulfilled the law for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ died for us – in our place and for our benefit. Our Lord Jesus Christ is risen from the dead for us – in our place and for our benefit. By this we have justification before God. We are forgiven, clean, holy, and righteous. The blessing of God is promised to us in Christ Jesus. It depends upon his work, not ours.

All this is ours in Holy Baptism. For in Holy Baptism, God claims us as His own, makes us His children, His heirs, and His holy people. And so it is that the work of our hands and its fruit is holy because we are holy in Christ. It is pressed into His service, and it thereby becomes a blessing to us and to our neighbor.

For this great gift, our reception of the blessings of God because of Christ Jesus our Lord, it is our duty to thank and praise, serve, and obey Him. This is not in order to receive the blessings but because in Christ we already have. With this in mind, we sit down on the first day of the week and set aside as He has prospered us to give to His church for His work of blessing in our midst (1 Cor. 16:2).
