As I look at Acts 1: 7-8 I hone in on the end of verse 8. "and you shall be witnesses to me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." (NKJV) emphasis added.

On a mission trip to Panama, I shared Christ without words, as I don't speak Spanish.

Little children played enthusiastically with a net, catching cloth fish after hearing a VBS story of the great catch of fish. I sat and helped one little girl with the craft that afternoon, sweating in the heat (no A/C). After our activities and snacks for the day, the little girl I had helped clutched my hand, wanting to take me home to be her dad (explained to me by the indigenous Pastor). Later, I realized that the love I had shown, as Christian love, transcended language, age, and location, and touched this little girl's heart.

Our witness is to be worn on our sleeves and seen by all. Now I realize that this little girl taught me, this educated pastor, something about the love of Christ which lives within us. The season to speak is always, and we don't necessarily need

words to convey the love of Christ. But what is it to live like Christ? But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8).

Speak in love even as Christ loves us. We see it in the mite recipients, whom we don't know and the love shown to them through LWML. Another season of speaking!

Florida-Georgia District LWML 2025 Mission Trip to Point of Grace Academy in Kenya: Reflections of Scarlet Holcombe, Whitney Marsh, Karen and Abby McCarthy and Rev. Francis Schroder.

This week is an opportunity to escape the breakneck pace of the West.

Scarlet Holcombe has a solid relationship with Point of Grace Academy and she is an expert with the ins and outs of travelling overseas. In all transparency, the experience is one of adventure and joy and a little fear and frustration. But, the Holy Spirit relieves fear and showers blessings.

Arriving in Atlanta, the team met to re-pack thirteen suitcases and three carry-on bags with generous donations. Customs is tricky, and having the bags searched is an expectation. The flight was interrupted by a medical emergency (not one of our team) and delayed arrival by five hours.

Quote from Whitney Marsh: "I have to say with that big of a flight, children of all ages, and all the various nationalities, it was impressive to see how well everyone did under the circumstances." Abby McCarthy, ten-year old granddaughter of Karen McCarthy shares her first impressions: "When we were walking through the school (on tour) I knew I had to trust in the Lord. I was really nervous but I loved it." Abby met her pen pal and quickly made many friends.



The beauty and expanse of Point of Grace Academy is impressive. The school campus is quite large with lots of farmland, hothouses, and animals. Every one of your senses is stimulated in this amazing adventure.

Braying donkeys are the official trumpeters to begin the day. Breezes crossing Lake Victoria cool the skin. Fresh African seasoning and spices tease tastebuds into submission. It is mesmerizing listening to the beauty of English, Swahili, and Luo being shared in conversation. A listener must focus on how words are spoken.

Each mission team member has specific responsibilities so everyone's gift from God shines His love. Teaching, crafting, speaking, singing, and playing. The Lord kept all busy in His work. The gifts sent need to be sorted daily so pillowcase dresses, school supplies, science kits, and craft materials can be purposely distributed. Home visits, souvenir jewelry from local artists, songs in worship, and hugs guarantee no one leaves empty.

Point of Grace fills every heart with tranquility. Now it is time to go home: "I miss my family and can't wait to hug them tight, but leaving the ones I love here in Kenya and the family I have made with my missionary teammates, pierces my heart with a sting that I can't describe. When will I be back? God's timing is not mine; His timing has been perfected since the beginning of creation. There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens (Ecclesiastes 3:1)"

An invitation is open for you to experience blessings, a sweet spicy cup of tea, and friendship with inspiring Kenyan brothers and sisters in Christ.

The knitters and crocheters at All Saints Lutheran Church in Blairsville, Georgia, had their needles busy making a host of items for the students, families, and mission field of Point of Grace Academy in Kisumu, Kenya. In six months they crafted 150 caps for children, 7 headbands, 22 hair ties, 22 dish cloths, 13 butterflies, 25 pocket prayer shawls, and 3 children's blankets.

## 2025 National Convention

HIGHLIGHTS TO SHARE: President, Liz Borth



Over 3,700 LWML people registered for this biennium convention in Omaha, Nebraska. Amazing to see so much purple and even more amazing at the easy flow of foot traffic. Despite some problems with transportation from

hotels, it was uplifting and encouraging to see how sisters-in-Christ help each other and work together. attendees from our entire District participated in two pinning ceremonies: Our YWR, Lilly Boettcher (Sarasota), and our first trained Heart to Heart Leader, Julie Kociuba (Tropical).





There are no words sufficient to describe the amazing experience of worshipping our Lord with over 4,000 people at the Opening Worship Service. Celebrating the Lord's Supper was incredible in that setting with over 100 clergy. The 40 beautiful District banners opened our business meeting with a procession of District



Our Convention began in a most appropriate manner with the prayer service for the Prayer Chapel held on the Ak-sar-ben patio (that is Nebraska spelled backwards). As the Pastor spoke words from Isaiah 55:10, "for as the rain comes down and the snow from heaven...." the rain actually did come down! We all scurried inside and finished the opening worship right outside the prayer chapel. Those very early morning Bible studies were interesting and stimulating and thought provoking for 806 people. If only there had been a coffee pot available.

The 537 eligible voters had fun practicing on the voting devices and then our 19 Delegates celebrated with all the LWML Florida-Georgia District delegation at our caucus. It was there the

Presidents and Young Women Representatives. The Florida-Georgia banner was designed and made by Tropical Zone, Elaine Stier.

The business of the convention included early, online voting. For one week in May, 555 voters cast 5,240 votes for the top 10 of 46 2025-2027 mission grant candidates. These are listed on our Florida-Georgia website. During Convention meetings, spokespersons of previous mission grant recipients spoke with appreciation for the LWML grant that allowed them to reach more people with Christ's Gospel.

The Lutheran Braille Workers received one of the first grants LWML distributed in 1941 and since that time LWML has granted over \$800,000 toward the continued ministry to those persons with poor or a loss of eyesight. At

our District Retreat in September 2025, we will Workers by putting together Bibles.

2025-2027 grant to purchase a laundry trailer, Rev. Paul Ernewein shared the mission and impressed us with his description of "Chick-Fil-A on steroids". He also stated no person

leaves hungry, and unlike some other groups

assisting in disaster areas there is no limit to how many meals a family can have.

Lutheran Deaf Outreach also received a grant for 2025-2027. Rev. John Reinke is deaf himself, but his dynamic and enthusiastic speaking presence encouraged everyone to laugh and cheer! Soon, five new production centers will produce 10,000 large print and braille Bibles and Christian materials.

Our District Mission Coordinator, Scarlet Holcombe, has arranged a trip to the Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch, also a 2025-2027 grant recipient. Think about a honey Sunday at your church to support the programs at the ranch (I received a bottle at the Exhibition Hall-yum!).
