

Depending on the translation of Luke 24:11, the women returning from Jesus' empty tomb spoke nonsense, or told an idle tale. Nonsense is defined as foolish or absurd language; something of no importance or usefulness but also insolent and pretentious behavior. Insolence can mean arrogant or brash disrespect; not constrained within proper or established limits. How could the Apostles who had spent three years learning and living with Jesus, who encouraged these women to follow Him, think that they spoke nonsense regarding the empty tomb and Jesus' missing body? I know that many times what a woman has to contribute to any conversation is patronized as useless information, and that attitude really

infuriates me! But stepping back and reviewing the scene from a different perspective, I see this group of mourning and grieving men thinking an excited and joyous announcement of folded grave clothes, no body, a sealed stone rolled away, and an angel sitting inside, were completely improper and brash disrespect. Just simply poor manners during the mourning period. However, they did follow up on what was reported, and found no nonsense in the women's report. The first to hear the good news were women who loved Jesus deeply; who spoke truth in love to hurting and confused people.

Ladies, I plead with you to speak fervently and earnestly regarding your love for Christ Jesus. We women of the LWML share God's love and message of hope, grace, and mercy through service, mission support, and working together to uplift and encourage each other in faith. Our mission is to proclaim Christ!

# COUNSELOR'S CORNER — JR. COUNSELOR

To "bear witness" to our Easter hope — the hope that comes from Christ's resurrection — means living in a way that shows we truly believe life has conquered death, love has conquered fear, and mercy has conquered sin. Here are a few ways we can bear witness to that hope:

**Living with Joy:** Not just surface-level happiness, but a deep joy rooted in the belief that death and suffering do not have the final word. Even in hardship, we can radiate a joy that points beyond the present moment.

**Being Agents of Reconciliation:** The Resurrection shows us that forgiveness is possible. When we seek reconciliation — forgiving those who wrong us and asking forgiveness ourselves — we are living out the Easter message.

**Practicing Courageous Love:** Easter hope makes us brave. We can step into the messiness of life — the pain of others, the injustice of the world — with a bold, self-giving

love, because we know love has already won.

Proclaiming with our Lives: Sometimes words are necessary, but often our lives are the loudest testimony. Living with integrity, compassion, patience, and trust points people to the risen Christ.



Walking with the Broken: Easter hope doesn't mean ignoring suffering. It means walking alongside it, bringing hope where there is despair, just like Christ bore our wounds and rose with them transformed.

I have for many years wondered how God collects coins, bills, and checks to "give" to hundreds, no thousands, of ministries: He does it through us all in the LWML. The world might call this "nonsense", but God says *Let's do it together*. My joy and honor is that I get to be a part of that reality.

Our Senior Pastoral Counselor, Rev. Dana Narring has resigned his position. He telephoned President Liz and explained that his congregation granted and encouraged him to take a sabbatical as soon as possible. He felt he would not be available to give to the LWML what time he felt the District deserves. He also shared how much he loves serving the women in our LWML Florida-Georgia District.

Your Executive Committee is actively working to fill Rev. Narring's term. In the meantime, Rev. Paul Meseke, recently elected Junior Pastoral Counselor for the second time, is well prepared and confident he can to handle all the needed duties of our Pastoral Counselor team.

Each church in the zone brought items to be assembled at the rally into student kit bags. Each kit contains a drawstring backpack, spiral notebook, two pocket folder, six new unsharpened pencils, small pencil sharpener, large eraser, six ballpoint pens, twelve inch ruler, round tip scissors, box of 24 crayons, toothbrush, small tube of toothpaste, bar of soap, and washcloth. A total of 200 kits were assembled for children in Central America, the Caribbean, and potentially Africa.



# LWML FL-GA DISTRICT RETREAT

2025 District Retreat will be September 5-7, at Epworth by the Sea Retreat Center, St. Simons Island, Georgia. The theme is "Hope Doesn't Let the Story End". Registration deadline is August 1. Additional information and the registration form can be found at https://www.flgalwml.com/2025\_retreat.

The Gifts from the Heart recipient will go to *The Village*: A Safe Harbor for Young Mothers. *The Village* is a home for young mothers ages 16 to 22 who are striving to build stable, independent lives for themselves and their children. It is located just a few blocks from the Children's Center and other residential programs on campus. The young



mothers have a space designed for them—a space that provides safety and support while keeping them connected to the network of resources Safe Harbor has built over the years. It is a 12 to 18-month program designed to equip young mothers with the skills and resources they need to thrive.

For our Servant Event, we will be putting together braille bibles for the Lutheran Braille Workers. The Lutheran Braille Workers exists to bring the Word of God to the 338 million people throughout the world who are blind or visually impaired, completely free of charge, in braille and specialized large print.

In addition, we will be cutting out braille angels for the IRIS Lending Library, the angels are used to help raise funds for the library. IRIS Lending Library for The Blind, Inc. is a lending library run solely by volunteers who lend out biblically-based books for free to legally visually-impaired and blind individuals.
